31st March 2024 - Easter Day

This Sunday is a reminder to us that, however desperate a situation might appear, if we truly believe, anything is possible. If you had been there 2000+ years ago on that crucifixion day and were a follower of Jesus what would your mood have been by the end of the day – desperate I guess. Then a couple of days later the confusion would have set in – what is this I am being told – can it be true, or is someone playing a dreadfully cruel joke?

We have the benefit of history. We know what happened over the coming days to prove that Jesus had risen but on that first Easter Day it must have been very difficult to know what was going on. In a few days we will read about Thomas, the so called "doubter". I don't blame him for needing some proof even though Jesus did gently rebuke him. But he wasn't turned away, he was invited closer in - "touch my wounds".

Even on days like Easter Sunday we may all have doubts and worries, but we have the promise that the risen Jesus is with us, the Jesus who has been there for all believers since the first Easter Day and who will be there for us until the end of time. It is our commitment to reach out to him in faith with the assurance that he will walk with us as he walked with those on the road to Emmaus, who we will also hear about soon. The difference is we don't have to recognise Jesus because we know he is here.

If Jesus had a care for the man on the cross next to him, even in Jesus' darkest, most desperate hour ("you will be with me in paradise", he tells the man), then we can be sure he is there for us.

On a more trivial note, if you are in Fordingbridge on Sunday morning I suggest you try to get to the Easter Eggs before I do – you have been warned! "Alleluia, Alleluia" this Sunday we can say "He is Risen indeed, Alleluia".

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Acts 10:34-43

Peter explains to Cornelius, a Gentile, the significance of Jesus' life.

³⁴ Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵ but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶ You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. ³⁷ That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸ how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹ We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰ but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹ not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴² He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³ All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

John 20. I-18

Mary Magdalene with Jesus on Easter Day.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. ²So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to

them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' ³Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. ⁴The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. ⁵He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. ⁶Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, ⁷and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. ⁸Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; ⁹for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. ¹⁰Then the disciples returned to their homes.

11 But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; ¹²and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. ¹³They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' ¹⁴When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' ¹⁶Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). ¹⁷Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." ' ¹⁸Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Reflection

The first Easter day was the fulfilment of our Lord Jesus Christ's ministry here on Earth. He overcame death and darkness and offered everlasting life to all those who accepted his word and the promise of everlasting life. Jesus suffered terribly during his trial and crucifixion on the first Good Friday. He is accused of treason and blasphemy by the priesthood and Caiaphas the high priest. He is abused and mocked by those around him and receives a flogging from Pilate. But for all his distress and pain, He says" Father forgive them for they know not what they do"

The first Easter day holds many events and signs as the resurrection of our Lord unfolds. Firstly the stone is mysteriously rolled away revealing an empty tomb, Simon Peter and John arrive at the tomb in great haste having been told the news, Jesus shows himself to Mary Magdala and to the Apostles in the upstairs room, also to the disciples on the road to Emmaus. Many begin to realize the meaning of his words when he said "The son of man must suffer pain and death, and on the third day rise again to fulfil the promise of everlasting life to all believers .

The Easter story is the most significant of the Christian festivals and it also marks the end of our Lord's ministry on Earth. It also heralds a new beginning and a fresh start for us and our Christian faith. Most important of all our relationship with our Heavenly Father and his son Jesus Christ. Let us pray for a fresh start this Easter.
